

Payment Information



All students are obliged to pay the semester contribution and the tuition fee on time in order to remain enrolled at the University of Erfurt. For the winter semester 2019/20, the deadline for the payment of fees is July 01, 2019, meaning that the University of Erfurt must have received both payments by June 30, 2019 at the latest. Please note that it often takes 2-3 days for German banks to complete transactions and that it is your responsibility to make sure your payment reaches the university in time. Otherwise, you will be charged (at least) a late fee of EUR 20.00 if your semester contribution is late.

Payment information for the semester contribution for the winter semester 2019/2020 is sent to your student e-mail address. In your (online) transfer order, please be sure to provide all the information given in the payment information to ensure that your payment is transferred to the correct account. It will otherwise not be possible to attribute your transaction to the Brandt School, which will mean substantial administrative extra work for you as well as the Brandt School staff.

Your student ID card (thoska) can only be validated for the new semester after all your payments (plus late fees, if those apply) have been received.

Mandatory Courses for First-Year Students

All students **must take** the following courses in their second semester:

- 100 PAM #02: Quantitative Analysis and Empirical Methods (incl. Tutorial)
- 200 MAM #01: Strategic Management and Public Administration
- 200 MAM #02: Financial Management in the Public Sector (incl. Tutorial)
- Internship: In addition to these courses, all first-year students must formally register for the mandatory MPP internship at the beginning of this semester, regardless of when it actually took or will take place!
- In addition, ONLY FOR CSMP-STUDENTS:
- **Mandatory:** Conflict Studies and Management: Analysis and Practical Conflict Management Skills

Master Thesis Colloquium for Second-Year Students

All students are **strongly encouraged** to participate in one of the research colloquia of **Prof. Dr. Grimm, Prof. Dr. Kemmerling, Prof. Dr. Richter, Dr. Aragón** or **Dr. Mello**.



Basic and Language Module

Rules and Regulations ("Studien- und Prüfungsordnung") prescribe that **you have to collect 9 credits** in this module. This means that you can either take three courses with 3 credits each (3+3+3=9) or one course with 3 credits and one with 6 credits (3+6=9). **The sum of credits you earn needs to equal the figure 9 in any case** (i.e., 6+6=12 is not possible). On top of that, should you wish to take more courses in this module, you are, of course, free to do so.

Specialization Modules

- By the end of their study period (third semester), all students must complete two specialization modules by
 obtaining a minimum of 9 credit points each in both modules (total of 18 credit points).
- You are, of course, free to audit additional courses with the instructor's permission, but be aware that you can still
 handle the course work of your mandatory classes.
- It is not possible to substitute credits earned in one module for credits earned in another module or to take a course twice if you already passed the first one.
- Only for CSMP students: CSMP students are required to complete the courses designed for this program by earning 9 credits in each CSMP module (compulsory CSMP I courses and elective CSMP II courses).

"Belegbogen" / Course Registration

All courses for which you wish to receive credit points during the summer semester must be marked on the so-called "Belegbogen" (Course Registration Form). Your "Belegbogen" is produced online on E.L.V.I.S. by yourself: https://sulwww.uni-erfurt.de/Account/Login.aspx (For the procedure, please check our course platform Campus, Information Desk).

Please make sure to choose those language courses which are open under the Master of Public Policy section (Basics and Language Module).

The "Belegbogen" must be printed, signed by you and your academic mentor, and turned in the <u>fourth week of</u> <u>the lecture period</u>. Please drop them off at the Brandt School Main Office <u>by Thursday May 02, 2019 no later than 3 p.m.!</u>

Keep in mind that your Academic Mentor must approve your course selection for each semester and that changes may be necessary before you turn the form in. Therefore, we recommend that you meet your mentor already some days prior to the deadline.

Independent Study Units

Independent Study Units (ISUs) aim at deepening the students' knowledge in certain public policy fields at an individual pace and are geared to individual needs. They can be a means of allowing students to equalize differing levels of prior knowledge.

Subject to approval by the academic mentor, the Brandt School's academic staff as well as faculty members or professors of the Faculty of Economics, Law and Social Sciences or other faculties of the University may be approached as supervisors for an ISU. According to Paragraph 11, Section 3 of the MPP Examination and Study Rules, an independent study agreement must be signed by both the student and the instructor at the beginning of the semester (within the course registration deadline) to receive credit points for an ISU. In this independent study agreement, the student pledges to work on an agreed topic and corresponding questions regularly and independently as well as to spend the necessary amount of time to reach the learning goals within a given time frame. To check the learning progress and to give the instructor an overview of the working status, specific assignments are given and regular meetings should be agreed upon.

ISUs can be pursued in the Basics and Language Module and in the Specialization Modules and substitute for a 3 credit point seminar.

If you are interested in enrolling in an independent study unit, please discuss its contents and how it fits into your study plan with your academic mentor and contact MPP Program Coordinator Theresa Dabla for more details regarding enrolment and the independent study agreement.

Course Description

In the modern social sciences, theoretical propositions must be tested with real world empirical data. Progress is enhanced by eliminating hypotheses which do not pass empirical testing. Therefore, scientific work is based on the interplay between theory and sound empirical testing. This introduction to quantitative methodology provides a course in statistics: sampling distribution; reducing complexity (means and deviations); describing data sets graphically; estimating population means; z-transformation and T-tests; associations between nominal and ordinal scaled data (cross-tabs, chi-square); associations between metric data (coefficient of correlation, OLS regressions).

About the Instructor

Before coming to the Brandt School, **Prof. Dr. Achim Kemmerling** worked for the Department of International Relations and the School of Public Policy, at Central European University Budapest. There he taught courses on methodology, political economy and development. His scholarly work spans comparative and international political economy, public policy and development and welfare. He currently works on a book project on human progress. Previously, he has worked as a consultant to the German parliament, the German Society for Technical Cooperation (former GTZ, now GIZ) and the European Investment Bank. Most recently, he has been involved in a project of the Open Society Foundation in Myanmar.

Multinational enterprises have become a major force in the global economy. Through their foreign investments they might not only influence a local economy but also the political and social environment. On the other hand, multinational enterprises are strongly affected by different political, regulatory, and legal conditions in the host countries. This course gives a basic understanding of the interactions of multinational enterprises and authorities in a host country. We will discuss topics such as international public private partnerships, transnational acquisitions, and issues of corporate social responsibility.

Course Description

The objectives of this course are to provide students with: (a) the analytical tools to analyze the public finances of governments: revenues, expenditures, ways to finance deficits and the institutions involved; and (b) a normative framework to conduct political analysis of the difficult financial decisions governments need to take. The course will use a combination of lectures, Harvard cases and an Oxford-style debate in order to learn about standard

economic theory, apply it in real life situations, and simulate a public debate where students will play the role of financial ministers making budgetary decisions.

Students are encouraged to review the financial situation of their own countries and to learn from the EU experience in class. Special focus will be given to the current financial crisis. A tutorial will be part of the course.

About the Instructor

Dr. Edgar Aragón is Visiting Scholar for Public Finance at the Brandt School. Previously, he taught at the Graduate School for Public Administration and Public Policy of Tecnológico de Monterrey, Mexico (EGAP-Tec de Monterrey), where he was he was Director of the Master's program in Economics and Public Policy until January 2008. During this time, he conducted socio-economic evaluations of public programs, such as lending to small and medium size firms; the social provisioning of milk; and the status of water infrastructure in Mexico. Before 2002, he worked as an economic and financial consultant in Mexico City and in Leuven, Belgium. He received both his PhD in City and Regional Planning and his Master's degree in Public Administration from Cornell University. He has been a Fellow at the United Nations University (UNU/IAS) in Tokyo, and at the Inter-American Foundation (IAF) in Washington. He is co-author of Harvard case studies and his research currently focuses on cluster policies for regional development, microfinance for poverty alleviation, and Public-Private Partnerships (PPPs) for infrastructure projects. He is now the leader of the Policy Recommendations Work Package for Nopoor, a 7th Framework Research Program of the European Commission on poverty alleviation.

Course Description

The Public Policy degree program (MPP) includes an internship as one of the requirements for the completion of the degree. Primary purposes of the internship are to offer students the opportunity to apply the knowledge and skills they have learned from the classroom in a work setting, to give students a practical perspective on policy analysis and public management and to help them compare their abilities and interests with requirements in particular fields of public policy. Internships may be conducted in government agencies, international organizations, NGOs, or other non-profit or for-profit organizations. The job description must show that the work assigned to the intern will be relevant to public policy analysis and/or management. Internships must last at least 180 hours, 5 of which may be used for writing the internship report. Normally, the internship will be undertaken during the summer

break between the second and the third semester (mid-July to mid-October). The hosting agency must name a specific person responsible supervising the intern and for communicating with the Brandt School if needed.

In order to receive credits for their internship, students have to submit an internship report of approximately 10 pages to the <u>respective Academic Mentor</u> (CC <u>publicpolicy@uni-erfurt.de</u>) no later than 30 days after the last day of the internship. As every semester, a large variety of language classes offered by the University's Language Center (*Sprachenzentrum*) falls under the "Basics and Language Module" and can thus be recognized in the MPP. Make sure to register for them under the MPP (Basics and Language Module) on E.L.V.I.S., not under "Zusätzliches Sprachstudium" (additional language courses), if you want them to count for the MPP!

The general rule is that German students are supposed to take language classes and learn a language other than German and English, while students from abroad advance their German skills to the highest level possible, but at least A2 (cf. § 10 of the MPP Study and Examination rules).

Check for time conflicts with (mandatory) MPP courses before signing up for a particular class!

Note that several classes require an extra early (online) sign-up procedure and/or participation in placement tests to determine your proficiency level. These may be scheduled as early as the Orientation Week or the first or second week of the semester! You can find the Language Center's online registration at https://onlinephilfak.uni-erfurt.de/.

German placement tests will take place on **Thursday April 04, 2019, 08 – 12 hrs**, at KIZ/ PC-Pool 1 and on **Wednesday April 24, 2019, 16 – 18 hrs**, at KIZ/ PC-Pool 1. Course Description

This seminar introduces students to Qualitative Comparative Analysis (QCA). In recent years, this methodological approach has seen a great increase in applications across the social sciences, including the political science subfields of public policy and comparative politics. Since its foundation by Charles Ragin in his seminal The Comparative Method (1987), QCA has undergone a dynamic development that included the creation of several different variants (crisp-set, fuzzy-set, and multi-value QCA, among others) as well as the design and constant evolution of software packages to conduct the analytical procedure (fs/QCA, Tosmana, and respective R packages). Drawing on set theory and emphasizing causal complexity, QCA combines elements of both qualitative and quantitative research. The seminar provides a step-by-step introduction to the method and its foundations, aiming to enable students to eventually conduct

their own QCA analysis with their own data. Individual course sessions comprise a lecture part and a part where exercises are solved, and concepts and methods are applied to empirical questions. For the practical application of QCA, participants will work within the R software environment ("RStudio" and the packages "QCA" and "SetMethods"), which will be introduced during the initial sessions.

About the Instructor

Dr. Patrick A. Mello is Visiting Scholar for Public Policy at the Brandt School, currently covering for the Franz Haniel Professorship for Public Policy. He is also a Research and Teaching Associate at the Chair of European and Global Governance at the Bavarian School of Public Policy at the Technical University of Munich (currently on leave). He received his PhD in Political Science from Humboldt University Berlin and held a Post-Doc position at the Technical University of Dresden from 2012 to 2016.

His substantive research focuses on foreign policy analysis and international security with an emphasis on the domestic sources of foreign policy and democratic conflict behavior. He also works on comparative and qualitative research methods, especially fuzzy-set QCA on which he has taught courses at the ECPR Summer School in Methods and Techniques and the Swiss Social Science Methods Summer School. He is the author of *Democratic Participation in Armed Conflict* (Palgrave Macmillan), which received the dissertation award from the German Political Science Association (DVPW) in 2015. His work has appeared in the *European Journal of International Relations, Journal of International Relations and Development, Security and Peace, West European Politics*, and elsewhere.

Course Description

This course is an introduction to mediation as an approach to conflict resolution in the international political sphere. We will look into the theory of mediation, its methods, and analyze the opportunities and challenges of applying mediation for dealing with conflict and complex policy issues in today's globalized society. The course seeks to simplify the field and bridge theoretical approaches with institutional frameworks and policy approaches on one hand, and equip students with practical tools and skills in mediation that can be applied in diverse policy fields on the other. This course is not a certification in mediation and is not an all-encompassing coverage on the topic. Instead, this is an introduction to the practice of mediation, complementing the existing theoretical courses at the university.

As such, it aims to give a broad overview of the issues related to applying mediation from the macro to the micro level, introduce the main actors conducting mediation in the international sphere and analyze the multiple stakeholders in peace-building processes and the different ways to approach them.

Mediation has been around for centuries and depending on culture, ideology, context and personal background and character there are many valuable ways of approaching it. There is no such thing as the "the right way" of applying mediation. What is important is that future mediators have a holistic understanding of the actors and issues, strategic approach to the process and professional conduct when it comes to conflict resolution.

Course Description

Is sustainability (in terms of a balance between social, economic and environmental aspects) compatible with the paradigm of economic growth and vice versa? Do we have to choose one over the other? While the two concepts are often portrayed as opposing, many also point to the inseparability of economic activity and the state of our environment and human well-being.

On a journey through the major economic and social theories concerning wealth creation, sustainable development and quality of life, we will analyze a variety of most important actors and their positions towards sustainability and economic activity (including multinationals, SMEs, NGOs, entrepreneurs, investors, cooperatives, governments, civil society). We will work with current and past cases to map the field of sustainable development from an macro- and microeconomic side and analyze how sustainability is already being implemented in different

contexts (for instance public administration, corporate management, entrepreneurship management). The aim of this course is to provide interested students with tools to identify conflicts of sustainability and develop respective solutions. Assignments in this course comprise a) a group analysis of a specific case; and b) a final in-class simulation game.

Course Description

The seminar first gives a general overview of EU Law with a focus on the "institutional triangle" of the EU (European Parliament, Council of the European Union and European Commission). Having understood the competences of the institutions, the seminar will concentrate on the legal system of the EU: primary legislation (the Treaties) and secondary legislation (especially regulations and directives). Thereupon, a basic understanding of the legislative procedures (assent procedure, co-decision procedure, cooperation procedure, consultation procedure) will be given.

On this basis, the seminar will analyze Art. 34 TFEU (free movement of goods) as a central freedom in the Union. The students will get to know the most important leading cases of the European Court of Justice (ECJ): "Dassonville", "Cassis de Dijon" and "Keck".

In intensive group work, recent ECJ cases on the free movement of goods will be analyzed. Finally, current legal challenges of the EU will be discussed, including the "Brexit".

Although members of European Union (EU) institutions regularly comment on the situation of women's rights in third countries, the situation within the EU is worth mentioning as well: The gender pay gap is declining slowly and is still high in Germany. Sexual harassment and sexism in the workspace and in private happen on a daily basis. Moreover, more women and men experience domestic violence than one thinks. However, for some theorists, the EU is somewhat the motor of gender equality in the European countries. Due to various directives and regulations, initiated by the European Commission and adopted by the Council of the European Union and the European Parliament, jurisdiction and policies regarding gender equality have changed in the past thirty years. Nevertheless, do they lead to gender equality in the EU?

How do the European institutions define 'gender equality' and 'equality of people with different sex'? What is the difference to 'equity' in this regard?

In the seminar, we will discuss these questions and identify the most important directives, regulations and initiatives regarding gender equality in the EU countries. Additionally, we will research on their implementation in selected member states. Finally, we will evaluate the role of the law and gender policies of the EU with regard to gender equality in the EU.

Course Description

The world today is awash with refugees and displaced people. Gruesome reports on migrants - of hundreds drowning as their rickety boats, capsized in the unforgiving waters, detained in squalid refugee camps, even summary execution of them in the high seas - have punctuated the headlines with predictable regularity in the recent past. Newspapers, agencies, television channels, social media, politicians and policy-makers around the world are divided as to how to face the immigration flow, particularly after the unrelenting unrest in Syria, Iraq and Afghanistan, with consequences reaching Europe. The plight of refugees has become an increasingly discussed topic in international relations.

Broadly, this class aims to provide a broad picture about refugees in international society. The course will first focus on the history of refugees and the development of terms and standards. It will then look at the three key periods – the inter-war period, the Cold War and the present - to understand how a specific image has defined the refugee over the years. It will then look at certain regional experiences in the form of case studies particularly with respect to their settlement experiences.

The class will have a participatory format with a mixture of lectures, student presentations and discussions. Students will gain valuable knowledge for approaching "the refugee problem" critically.

About the Instructor

Dr. Anwesha Ghosh is the recipient of the Initialization Postdoctoral Fellowship for Female Academics 2018-2019 at the University of Erfurt, Germany. She is also an Adjunct Fellow at the Centre for Pakistan and West Asian Studies, University of Calcutta.

The seminar overviews conceptions of natural resource justice in light of pressing issues in domestic and global resource politics - climate change, resource curse, indigenous rights, depletion of global commons and biodiversity loss. Natural resources are in the center of many international conflicts and global justice issues – territorial disputes, climate change, global poverty, resource curse are just a few examples. This seminar discusses available approaches to natural resource justice in contemporary international political theory and philosophy. It compares these approaches with the system of rights to natural resources anchored in the international law system of state sovereignty and with the international law regimes regulating global commons.

The second part of the class is organized as a series of research workshops about cases which students choose and research on their own. The seminar aims at providing students analytical framework and a justice perspective to analyze critically various issues of natural resource justice and governance in contemporary world.

Course Description

In this course, we will look at policies designed to fight poverty and inequality and their chances and challenges in developing countries. We start with a comparative overview over different types of 'models' and welfare regimes across the world. Then we focus on challenges of welfare state finances such as tax competition and revenue generation. Once we know the revenue side, we look at types of expenditures such as social insurance, social benefits and recent innovations in this area (e.g. unconditional cash transfer programs). Next, we will look at some main areas of social policy (such as health, employment and education). Finally, we look at some related areas such as microfinance. In all sessions, we will not only look at successful and unsuccessful cases, but also at specific challenges in lower- and middle-income countries such as corruption or patronage.

About the Instructor

Before coming to the Brandt School, **Prof. Dr. Achim Kemmerling** worked for the Department of International Relations and the School of Public Policy, at Central European University Budapest. Throughout the seminar, emphasis is placed on a systematic introduction of the different theories and approaches, as well as a critical assessment of their respective explanatory power. The seminar's ten substantive sessions provide a thorough introduction to the political science subfield of foreign policy analysis. Each of these sessions contains a reading that introduces the respective theory or approach and applies it to a real-world foreign policy case. The substantive sessions are complemented by two "writing workshops" that provide opportunities to discuss ideas for final papers, practice the specifics of scientific writing, and get feedback on early drafts.

Is sustainability (in terms of a balance between social, economic and environmental aspects) compatible with the paradigm of economic growth and vice versa? Do we have to choose one over the other? While the two concepts are often portrayed as opposing, many also point to the inseparability of economic activity and the state of our environment and human well-being.

On a journey through the major economic and social theories concerning wealth creation, sustainable development and quality of life, we will analyze a variety of most important actors and their positions towards sustainability and economic activity (including multinationals, SMEs, NGOs, entrepreneurs, investors, cooperatives, governments, civil society). We will work with current and past cases to map the field of sustainable development from an macro- and microeconomic side and analyze how sustainability is already being implemented in different

contexts (for instance public administration, corporate management, entrepreneurship management). The aim of this course is to provide interested students with tools to identify conflicts of sustainability and develop respective solutions. Assignments in this course comprise a) a group analysis of a specific case; and b) a final in-class simulation game.

The world today is awash with refugees and displaced people. Gruesome reports on migrants - of hundreds drowning as their rickety boats, capsized in the unforgiving waters, detained in squalid refugee camps, even summary execution of them in the high seas - have punctuated the headlines with predictable regularity in the recent past. Newspapers, agencies, television channels, social media, politicians and policy-makers around the world are divided as to how to face the immigration flow, particularly after the unrelenting unrest in Syria, Iraq and Afghanistan, with consequences reaching Europe. The plight of refugees has become an increasingly discussed topic in international relations.

Broadly, this class aims to provide a broad picture about refugees in international society. The course will first focus on the history of refugees and the development of terms and standards. It will then look at the three key periods – the inter-war period, the Cold War and the present - to understand how a specific image has defined the refugee over the years. It will then look at certain regional experiences in the form of case studies particularly with respect to their settlement experiences.

The class will have a participatory format with a mixture of lectures, student presentations and discussions. Students will gain valuable knowledge for approaching "the refugee problem" critically.

Course Description

The end of the Yugoslav Wars (1991-2001) marked a significant transition from direct conflict to 'negative peace' (absence of direct conflict) in the Balkans region. However, the region is far from having a 'positive peace'. The course aims to familiarize the students with the complexities of peace missions and post-conflict peace-building in the Balkans especially focusing on Kosovo. The students will be introduced to the history and politics of the region in general and Kosovo in particular. An important theme that will be dealt with is why building peace in Kosovo becomes significant not only for Europe but the international community in general. It will also examine the performance of the international community by analyzing the role of the UN, EU and OSCE.

However, any peace-building effort is not considered legitimate without the participation of the locals. Therefore, studying the local actors and how they impact the legitimacy of peace processes becomes an absolute necessity. The course will consist of fieldwork to Kosovo in April to facilitate the grasp of local participation in peace-building efforts. The primary objective is to understand the interface and interaction of the external, as well as internal actors leading to a successful and legitimate conflict transformation and peace-building in Kosovo.

He is also a Research and Teaching Associate at the Chair of European and Global Governance at the Bavarian School of Public Policy at the Technical University of Munich (currently on leave). He received his PhD in Political Science from Humboldt University Berlin and held a Post-Doc position at the Technical University of Dresden from 2012 to 2016. His substantive research focuses on foreign policy analysis and international security with an emphasis on the domestic sources of foreign policy and democratic conflict behavior. He also works on comparative and qualitative research methods, especially fuzzy-set QCA on which he has taught courses at the ECPR Summer School in Methods and Techniques and the Swiss Social Science Methods Summer School. He is the author of *Democratic Participation in Armed* Conflict (Palgrave Macmillan), which received the dissertation award from the German Political Science Association (DVPW) in 2015. His work has appeared in the European Journal of International Relations, Journal of International Relations and Development, Security and Peace, West European Politics, and elsewhere.
