Can I Pay With Trash? Recycling Credits: The New Brazilian Strategy to Improve Waste Management

Garbage production has affected humanity in proportions never seen before. Waste management plays a vital role not only in the transition to a circular economy, but also in tackling climate change. The challenge is even bigger in developing countries due to the lack of infrastructure, but the Brazilian bet on a market-based solution can give us some insights into the problems and how to overcome them. The Brazilian government launched a Recycling Credit Certificate in 2022. The incentive-based approach seems to be promising, but it lacks enforcement regulation, social inclusion mechanisms, and distortion of regional markets can be an issue.

How Can the Democratization Process in Mynamar Be Revived?

This February marked two years since the military coup in Myanmar. The prison sentence against Myanmar freedom fighter and politician Aung San Suu Kyi in Dec 2022 by the judiciary controlled by the military junta shows once again that the situation in Myanmar is deteriorating rapidly. This process has also been and continues to be facilitated by failures in development policy. In this piece, Prof. Dr. Achim Kemmerling and doctoral student Aye Aye Htun shed light on which aspects of development policy have had a negative impact and what Germany can now do to revive the democratization processes in

Myanmar, which were once advanced in particular by Aung San Suu Kyi.

Cash-Based Interventions as a Social Protection Tool for Women in Humanitarian Crises

'In recent years, Nepal and Syria have continued to experience humanitarian crises that have prompted the governments and several donor agencies to aid those affected in the form of cash-based interventions. First-year students at the Willy Brandt School, Aditi Tyagi, Holly Warner, Su Wai Phyoe & Tracy Shimoli, take a deeper look into these interventions with a particular focus on their role in protecting women. They do this by comparing the two countries and highlighting the experiences of female beneficiaries of the cash grants and its effect on their personal autonomy and susceptibility to intimate personal violence.'
