**Klaus Weinhauer (Bielefeld University):**

**“A Return of a Many-headed Hydra?”**

**Spatio-temporal aspects of collective action, social movements, and violence in port cities (c. early 1900s-mid 1920s)“**

The author sheds new light on the global phase of upheaval stretching roughly from the early 1900s until the mid-1920s. He will employ spatio-temporal perspectives on collective action, social movements and violence, and will also discuss related translocal and transnational fears. All this will be framed by the question which influence World War One had on all these issues.

Klaus Weinhauer is professor of modern history at Bielefeld University. He received his PhD and his Habilitation from Hamburg University.

He was fellow at the re:work Research Center (Berlin), at the Netherlands Institute for Advanced Study (NIAS), at the Modern European History Research Centre (MEHRC, Oxford), and at the Centre for Interdisciplinary Research (ZIF, Bielefeld).

He has published widely on the history of social movements (incl. labor), urban violence, terrorism, crime and policing.
