Workshop 1: Formats, Didactics, Curriculum Development, Syllabi & Manuals, Examination Practices and Constructive Alignment

This workshop offers practical guidance for designing and revising clinic courses with clear learning outcomes and constructive alignment. We compare teaching formats and didactic approaches, discuss syllabi and manuals, and map assessments to competencies and professional standards.

 Workshop 2: Interdisciplinary Teaching: Relevance of Non-Legal Knowledge for Strategic Litigation and Clinical Work

This workshop examines how expertise beyond law—e.g., social sciences, data science, journalism, and design—strengthens case strategy, evidence, and remedies in strategic litigation. We discuss how to embed such skills in clinical teaching and supervision, from framing research questions to managing interdisciplinary teams and navigating challenges of legal translation.

 Workshop 3: Managing and Financing Clinical Education and Partnerships: Squaring Professionalism, Sustainability and Independence

This workshop explores how to structure and fund clinical programs without compromising pedagogical quality or professional standards. We examine funding, partnership designs and case-selection workflows, and discuss supervision frameworks that balance student learning with partner expectations and client protection.

Workshop 4: From Resilience to Resistance: Rebellious Lawyering and Clinical Education in Times of Democratic Backsliding and Autocratic Legalism:

In this workshop, participants will reflect on the changing legal-political contexts of clinical work and activism, which are increasingly marked by democratic backsliding, shrinking spaces for civil society and autocratic uses of the law. Continuing debates from the keynote session, participants will share experiences and best practices of how teaching, clinical work, and activist collaborations need to change in response to legal and political pressures at home and abroad.

• Workshop 5: Working with Open Source Information: Investigation Planning for Clinical Legal Education:

In this workshop, we will introduce participants to the cutting-edge practice of digital open source investigation (OSI), illustrating several ways in which OSI-based skills are increasingly relevant to clinical legal education. Drawing from our experiences running the first law school-based open source investigation lab, we will engage participants in hands-on activities that can be used to strengthen the efficacy, efficiency and ethics of related practices. We will also introduce participants to the Berkeley Protocol on Digital Open Source Investigation – the international standards published by the UN Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights – and demonstrate how the Protocol can help guide student engagement. Finally, we will offer tips and tricks for helping students through the psychosocial challenges of engaging with distressing material online, supporting their sustainability as lawyers.
